By Rebecca Heartz - American Bar Association, Family Law Quarterly CONDUCT AN INDEPENDENT INVESTIGATION: The first task in the investigation is to review all relevant documents and records including those of the social services

department, police, court, physician and school. Direct interviews with the child, parents, social workers, relatives, school personnel and others having knowledge of the

facts in the situation are crucial in getting a clear picture of the child's life. The CASA should continue seeking new information throughout the court process and should have regular in-person contact with the child.

DETERMINE THE INTERESTS OF THE CHILD: Many factors should be considered in assessing the interests of the individual child, including age and sense of time; level of maturity; culture and ethnicity' and degree of attachment to family members including siblings. Also important to the child's chances for healthy development are

SEEK COOPERATIVE SOLUTIONS: The CASA functions as a mediator among conflicting parties to facilitate the resolution to problems and to foster positive steps toward achieving permanence of the child.
 PROVIDE WRITTEN REPORTS AT EVERY HEARING

APPEAR AT ALL HEARINGS TO REPRESENT THE CHILD'S INTERESTS: The CASA should ensure that all relevant facts are presented to the court. This means that the CASA should ensure that all necessary witnesses are called and should be

prepared to provide testimony.

8. MONITOR IMPLEMENTATION OF SERVICE PLANS AND COURT ORDERS: The

follow-up activities in a child's case are critical because this is often where the system fails. The CASA is the watchdog who assures that court-ordered services and

tasks are completed in an appropriate and timely manner and that they accomplish the desired outcome. The CASA should also monitor the court process to assure the hearings are held in a timely manner.
9. INFORM THE COURT PROMPTLY OF IMPORTANT DEVELOPMENTS: The court should be made aware of an agency's failure to provide a court-ordered service or

the family's failure to participate in services. The CASA should ensure that appropriate motions are filed on behalf of the child in order that the court can be made aware

10. ADVOCATE FO THE CHILD'S BEST INTEREST IN THE COMMUNITY: The CASA should interface with mental health, educational and other community systems to assure that the child's needs in all these areas are met.
